Air Quality Improves as Stagnant Weather Passes

Agency thanks those who voluntarily postponed wood burning activities.

VANCOUVER, Wash. – The National Weather Service has lifted the Air Stagnation Advisories called last week during the lingering stagnant weather conditions. As a result the Southwest Clean Air Agency (SWCAA) has lifted the Air Quality Advisories that called on residents of Cowlitz and Lewis Counties to voluntarily postpone their wood burning activities. A low pressure system has moved in over western Washington bringing some precipitation and improved ventilation allowing better mixing and clearing of air pollutants such as wood smoke. Forecasters currently expect favorable conditions to prevail through the weekend with another high pressure system possible early next week. SWCAA will watch the weather forecasts and the air pollution monitors and advise of any changes.

Even during more favorable weather conditions the Southwest Clean Air Agency encourages everyone who heats their homes with wood to burn as clean as possible, using only dry, seasoned firewood and being mindful smoke impacts on their neighbors. Outside of Urban Growth Areas where outdoor burning is allowed it should only be conducted with a proper permit as required, without causing a smoke nuisance and burning only natural vegetation.

Fine particles released by smoke from wood stoves, fireplaces, outdoor burning and automobiles

are of concern because they can reach deep into the lungs. Air pollution can trigger asthma

attacks, cause difficulty breathing and make lung and heart problems worse. Air pollution is

especially harmful to children, people with heart and lung problems and adults over age 65.
